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## **RICK CADY, Prevention Manager for the Department of Human Services, Addiction and Mental Health Division**

A graduate of the University of Oregon, Rick Cady has more than thirty-eight years experience in the addictions, prevention and treatment fields. Currently, he is the Prevention Manager for the Department of Human Services, Addiction and Mental Health Division (AMH). Rick Cady has extensive experience with the *Communities That Care* model as an Intervention Specialist with the Community Youth Development Study. This study was a random control research trial of *Communities That Care* in seven states - 24 communities, with Drs. J. David Hawkins and Michael Arthur at the University of Washington, Social Development Research Group (SDRG). Rick was also Project Director for *Communities That Care* Training and Technical Assistance at SDRG. Rick was a senior consultant and Director of Training for *Communities That Care* with Developmental Research and Programs and the Channing Bete Company, providing project management, consulting, and training to a number of statewide and six international implementations of *Communities That Care*.

## **ERIC MARTIN, MA, CADC III, Past President and Executive Director Emeritus, Addiction Counselor Certification Board of Oregon**

Eric Martin is Past President and Executive Director Emeritus of the Addiction Counselor Certification Board of Oregon (ACCBO). He is an Instructor with the University of Oregon and Oregon's Child Welfare Division. Mr. Martin has more than 20 years of clinical experience in Inpatient Psychiatric Hospitalization, Residential and Outpatient Addictions Treatment, and Alcohol, Tobacco and Other Drugs (ATOD) Prevention. As a recovering person, clinician and educator, Eric brings insight and humor in understanding the drug-brain-behavior connection. Eric is an international presenter and treatment advocate and has been honored with numerous awards over the years, including the Oregon Governor's Award of Excellence. Eric has also produced a number of videos, including "Reunited," a video designed for methamphetamine addicted mothers entering the child welfare system

## **PAULINE MARTEL, BA, CPS, Douglas County Prevention Coordinator and Director of Prevention and Training, ADAPT**

Pauline Martel is the Douglas County Prevention Coordinator and Director of Prevention and Training for Adapt, a private non-profit Alcohol and other Drug Prevention and Treatment agency serving Douglas, Josephine, and Coos Counties in Oregon. She is a part time instructor at Umpqua Community College and the University of Oregon, as well as a trainer for the Oregon Department of Human Services Addiction and Mental Health Division (AMH) where she provides statewide training on a number of subjects (e.g., Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders, Traumatic Brain Injury, Drug Abuse and Domestic Violence, and Substance Abuse Prevention Specialist Training [SAPST]). Ms. Martel has worked with children and families for over 36 years. In addition to her experience working with children and families in alcohol and other drug programs, she was an early childhood education teacher for over 15 years and a K-8 classroom teacher. She continues to work with children and families as a classroom guest speaker and parent educator. She provides staff development training for teachers, counselors, and the business community. Pauline has been the recipient of various awards and honors throughout her career, most recently receiving the Douglas County Health Center “Public Health Hero Award” in 2007.

## **LINDA WAGNER, MS, Research and Development Manager, Douglas County Juvenile and Health Departments**

Linda Wagner is the Research and Development Manager for two Douglas County Departments – the Juvenile Department and Health and Social Services Department. She conducts program evaluations to measure the efficacy of services provided by these departments. That work also includes evaluating the cost avoidance associated with juvenile and health services in Douglas County. The cost avoidance model evaluates the fiscal costs of programs as compared to the individual and community benefits they provide. Linda completed her graduate work from the University of Oregon in Public Policy, Planning and Management with a concentration in program evaluation. She has been with Douglas County since October of '09 and has been a program evaluator for twenty years. She is also a grant writer and over her tenure has leveraged more than \$17 million in community, state, and federal grants. She has served as a national consultant and facilitated projects related to strategic planning, program evaluations and training on evidence practices.
